

Caseloads Declining in Almost All States

- More than 40 states have declined since recessionary peaks
- Likely driven by economy
- Three month time limit a factor
- The share of the population receiving SNAP was lower in 2016 than in 2013 in 45 states.

Percentage change in SNAP participants as share of population between Fiscal Year 2013 and Fiscal Year 2016





Maryland Statewide Unemployment Rate



Monthly income for family of three, based on weekly earnings at \$10/hour






Many SNAP Participants Find Work On Their Own

- More than half of households with a working-age nondisabled adult work while receiving SNAP.
- More than 80 percent work in the year before or after receiving SNAP.
- Rates are even higher for families with children.

Work participation during the previous and following year for households that received SNAP in a typical month









Negative SNAP Proposals in State Legislatures in 2017


